Families reach 1 million adventures on TRACK Trails

Our Kids in Parks program is marking a powerful milestone with children and families completing one million adventures on TRACK Trails! The figure represents more than one million miles hiked, biked, or paddled, and more than 500,000 hours spent outdoors.



Originally designed to get families to consider the trails along the Blue Ridge Parkway a resource for their health, the program has grown into a national network of trails.

Plant nursery intern

Goal: \$20,000

The 80,000-plus acres that comprise the Blue Ridge Parkway are home to more than 2,000

plant species. To protect this flora, the National Park Service is preparing to create a plant nursery that can help bolster



threatened and rare native plants like the Heller's Blazing Star.

Your gift will also create a learning experience for an intern who will assist park biologists in laying the groundwork for the nursery, including site selection, development of educational materials for visitors, and propagating plants.

Goal: \$25,000

The development of the Blue Ridge Parkway and its evolution over the decades is a fascinating story that is brought to life through photographs. Thousands of images in the Parkway's archives dating back to the initial days of construction in the 1930s are not available for public viewing. This project will begin the process of organizing and digitizing historical park photographs so they can be made available online for everyone to enjoy.

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Summer is the season for spotting black bears and cubs along the Parkway. Make sure your encounter is safe with these tips:

- Watch your speed; a bear family might be crossing the road just around the bend.
- If a bear approaches you, do not run. Slowly back away.
- Do not corner a bear or cubs, and that includes surrounding a tree where they have taken refuge.
- Do not feed bears.

Explore the art and influence of the Cone family

The Cones will be the talk of the village this summer as Blowing Rock Art & History Museum brings pieces from the art collections of Claribel and Etta Cone (siblings of Moses H. Cone) to the mountains for *Modern Visions, Modern Art: The Cone Sisters in North Carolina* from August 3 through November 30.

The art collection of Dr. Claribel and Etta Cone is cherished by art historians and museumgoers alike, and the exhibit presents a compelling selection of works on paper, paintings, and sculptures by artists in the collection who drew the admiration and attention of Claribel and Etta: Henri Matisse, Jacques Villon, Marie Laurencin, Ben Silbert, John Graham, Everett Bryant, Gertraud Brausewetter, Ilse Breit, Teresa Denny, and Bernice Oehler.

The sisters' art collection was made possible with the financial support of their brothers' thriving textile business in North Carolina. The Blue Ridge Parkway Foundation is offering a companion exhibit at the museum titled *Modern Visions, Mountain Views: The Cones of Flat Top Manor*. It connects the story of the Cone family to the Blowing Rock estate built by "Denim King" Moses H. Cone and his wife, Bertha Lindau Cone.

The museum is also offering a variety of talks, tours, and activities that delve into the art and lives of the Cones.

The museum is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday, and noon to 4 p.m., Sundays. Entrance is free.
